





On Remembrance Day, Canadians pause to honour the men and women who have served and continue to serve Canada during times of war, conflict, and peace. More than 2,300,000 Canadians have served and more than 118,000 made the ultimate sacrifice.



The poppy is the symbol of Remembrance Day. In the run-up to Remembrance Day, replica poppies are sold by the Royal Canadian Legion to provide assistance to veterans.

The reason that the poppy is worn for Remembrance Day is due to a Canadian physician and poet who noticed how quickly poppies had grown over the graves of soldiers who had died during the Battle of Ypres. This symbolism of the blood-red flowers was beautifully captured by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae in his 1915 poem "In Flanders Fields." The poem was apparently discarded by McCrae but was found by soldiers who sent it to a London-based magazine named Punch.

In Flanders Fields

In Flanders Fields, the poppies <u>blow</u> Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie,
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

Gertrude the Great

November 17th

St. Gertrude the Great, or St. Gertrude of Helfta, was born on January 6, 1256 in Germany. She eventually chose to follow the Lord by pursuing a vocation as a

Benedictine Nun. Her deep relationship with the Lord in prayer led to her being hailed as a mystic. She was also regarded as a great theologian and went on to become one of the great mystics of the 13th century.

Although little is known about Gertrude's childhood, it is widely accepted that at just four-years-old, she was enrolled in the Cistercian monastery school of Helfta in Saxony, under the governance of Abbess Gertrude of Hackerborn.

Gertrude, known for being charming and able to win people over, entered the Benedictine Order at Helfta and became a nun. She devoted herself to her studies, and received an education in many different subjects. Gertrude was both fluent in Latin and very familiar with scripture and works from the Fathers of the Church, including Augustine.

In 1281, 25-year-old Gertrude experienced her first series of visions that would continue until the day she passed away. Her priorities turned away from secular teachings and focuses more on studying Scripture and theology. Her life became full with this awakening and she was an enthusiastic student, writing for the spiritual benefit of others.

On November 17, 1301, Gertrude passed away. Throughout her life, Gertrude produced numerous writings, although only a few still exists today. One of her longest surviving works is *Legatus Memorialis Abundantiae Divinae Pietatis* (*The Herald of Divine Love*).

Although Gertrude was never formally canonized, Rome approved a liturgical office of prayer and readings in her honor. To separate her from Abbess Gertrude of Hackeborn, Pope Benedict XIV gave her the title, "the Great," making her the only woman saint to be called, "the Great."

Baked Cod with Tomato and Thyme

Ingredients

1 medium onion
6 oz. mini sweet peppers
salt
1 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil
1 pt. grape tomatoes, halved
8 springs fresh thyme
1 ½ lb. cod fillets
¼ c. water
pepper
whole-grain rolls, for serving




Directions

- 1. In a 7 to 8 quart wide-bottomed over-safe saucepot on medium-high, cook onion, peppers, and ½ teaspoon of salt in olive oil for 5 minutes or until onions are almost tender, stirring occasionally.
- 2. Add tomatoes and thyme; cook 2 minutes. Add cod fillets and water; sprinkle cod with ½ teaspoon each salt and pepper. Cover and bake at 450 degrees F for 15 minutes or until cod is cooked. Discard thyme sprigs. Serve with whole-grain rolls.







Emily's House: A novel by: Amy Belding Brown

An evocative new novel about Emily Dickinson's long-time maid, Irish immigrant Margaret Maher, whose bond with the poet ensured Dickinson's work would live on.

Massachusetts, 1869. Margaret Maher has never been one to settle down. At twenty-seven, she's never met a man who has tempted her enough to relinquish her independence to a matrimonial fate, and she hasn't stayed in one place for long since her family fled the potato famine a decade ago.

When Maggie accepts a temporary position at the illustrious Dickinson family home in Amherst, it's only to save money for her upcoming trip West to join her brothers in California. Maggie never imagines she will form a life-altering friendship with the eccentric, brilliant Miss Emily or that she'll stay at the Homestead for the next thirty years.

In this richly drawn novel, Amy Belding Brown explores what it is to be an outsider looking in, and she sheds light on one of Dickinson's closest confidentes—perhaps the person who knew the mysterious poet best—whose quiet act changed history and continues to influence literature to this very day.


