Readings

On this day, November 11, countries within and outside the Commonwealth celebrate Remembrance Day or Veterans Day, recalling the sacrifice made by our men and women in the military who died in the World Wars and in other subsequent battles. Catherine's death occurred seventy—seven years before the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918. We honour Catherine. We honour the men and women who gave their lives in the service of their country.

The bright moment in grief is when the sore absence gradually changes into a well of presence. You become aware of the subtle companionship of the departed one. You know that when you are in trouble, you can turn to the presence beside you, and draw on it for encouragement and blessing. The departed is now no longer restricted to any one place but can be with you any place you are. It is good to know the blessings of this presence.
